Stephen Staples was born about 1758-1749 or 50 in Virginia & died in Wilkes Co., Ga. March 4th 1805. His place of residence during the Revolutionary War was Wilkes Co.

He assisted in establishing American Independence while acting as private soldier Georgia line Rev. War.

Stephen Staples name is found in the list of Rev. soldiers who participated in the historic battle of Kettle Creek, Wilkes Co., Ga. under Col. Stephen Heard, Genl's Elijah Clarke, Dealy & Pickens, Capt. John Freeman, Stephen Staples was one among the early settlers of Fort Heard.

Staples Family History by Eleanor Lexington

All the traditions of the Staples family history point to French ancestry, although record ~~now~~ begins in England. Staples is the name of a town in France, it is a seaport, & not far from Boulogne, the more familiar form now is Etaples. The family may have taken their name from this town, & gone over to England in the train of the Conqueror, and possibly given their name in Devon now called Staples. De Staples is said to have been one form of the same name. One meaning of Staples as everyone knows, is a fastening stake -- and Stapleton is a town enclosed by stakes.

The Chaplain of Henry VIII was Edward Staples (Bishop) & most beloved man of his Prince.

The history of the Staples in this country begins probably with John who settled at Weymouth Mass. 1636. He came from England one of his three sons was Abraham, or Abram, & his descendants may claim affiliation with the Society of Colonial Wars, for he was in Phillips War 1675, and his son Abraham, was the first white child born in Mendon, Mass. 1638, and his son also Abraham was a large land owner, at Mendon, Mass. He had three wives, Abigail, Thankful, & Lydia, & thirteen children. Samuel was another favorite name in the Staples family & three Samuels were founders of families. One was living at Dedham in 1701, one at Bridgewater, & married Elizabeth Pratt the other Samuel was a freeman of Rhode Is. 1664. His descendant Mr. Read Staples, born about 1794 (130 years later) was Chief Justice of Rhode Island, & one of the founders of its Historical Society.

The Staples were early settlers in Maine. They also found their way to California, where a town is named for them.

One member of the family was Vice Pres. of the Society of California Pioneers, & was a delegate to the Convention which nominated Lincoln.
The Staples have always been a power in the South, they trace back to John Staples, an early settler in Va. And one of his posterity Valles Redd Staples was a noted Jurist of the Old Dominion.

Inter marriage in the Martin family - Jennie Staples m. John Martin, & their son Thomas Staples Martin, was a U. S. Senator. Another marriage connecting was with the family of Gen. John B. Gordon, one of the P.F.V's. John F. Staples of Patrick Co. married Sarah Penn, cousin of Wm. Penn founder of Pa. Among other connections of the family may be mentioned the Vaughns, Arnolds, Wrights, Pratt's, Mills, Philips, Bonds, Standishes, Hardins, Desiors, Flukers. Favorite Christian names of the family in olden days, Deborah, Abigail, Remember, Lorena, Elithere.

As to their War record the Staples have always been in the thickest of the fight, & number not only the rank and file but many distinguished officers. At the surrender of York Town one of the soldiers was John Staples, & was promoted Major for gallantry. The famous sugar house, on Liberty St. New York City, was where the British confined the American prisoners during the War of Independence, was built by John Jacob Staples, born in Prussia, & one of the first if not the first to introduce the art of sugar refining. The Staples have been distinguished in the professions, especially in law, and at one time three Staples, were judges of the Supreme Court.

Characteristics are, "public spirited" sound judgement & great culture".
