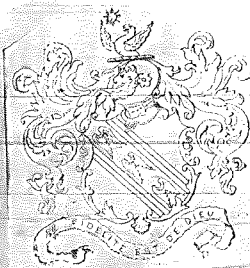

Thomas, John and Robert were sons of Thomas of York River.
with other children:

Ruth, baptized Oct. 18, 1691 - no more information

Thomas, son of Thomas of York River and first wife

Mary, born 1693, married Sarah Ballard.

Robert, born 1697, married Ann?

Mary, baptized 25 Feb. 1699/1700, no more information.

Elizabeth, baptized 12 July 1702, no more information.

Thomas and brother John, born in New Kent, were
of Hanover County after location of that county in 1721
out of a part of New Kent in accordance with an act of
the House of Burgesses of 20 (26) November 1720.

The Tringfield Family Tree gives John as the
husband of Sarah Ballard but Virginia records show
that Thomas Tringfield was named as an executor
of the will of John Ballard and he married Sarah Ballard.
Because of the loss of all official records of Hanover
County between 1735 and 1783, prevents knowing
whether Thomas and Sarah died testate or the
dates of their deaths.

This is the same John Wingfield whose lands were processed at some time as those of John, deceased as hereinafter mentioned. After his son John reached majority this John referred to in extant records as John W. Sr. As such he was allowed a claim for goods he had furnished in Hanover Co. Va. for use of the army of Revolution. John Wingfield Sr. died testate in Wilkes County where his will, dated 10 March 1791 was proved 5 Jan 1794. In it he provided for his wife and 10 children:

The first Wingfield who came to America was

Because of dissention among the group,
however, Edward Kingfield was deposed and
John Smith put in charge. He was still
alive in 1613 but there is no further record
of him. Virginia records say that his mother
was a cousin of Queen Elizabeth.

John Nelson came to Wilkes County, Georgia in 1775 from Maryland and was given the first land grant in Georgia located in the southern part of Wilkes County. On a rock on this place he drew a map of this grant on one side of which he inscribed 1775 and on another side the date 1792. This rock has since been moved and is placed on the lawn of the Wilkes County Court House in Washington, Georgia.

John Nelson's sister, Kitty, married Archibald Simpson and John Nelson went back to Maryland and persuaded his brother-in-law to allow wife Kitty and the two little boys to come to Georgia with him.

Kitty Nelson Simpson, therefore, came all the way from Maryland on horse back, bringing the youngest of the boys, William Simpson, in front of her. He was two years old. Archibald Simpson joined his family after the war.

This William Simpson, who married Martha Wingfield, was the first person in Wilkes Co. to be granted a patent. It was a patent for a machine for the transmission of power and is dated 1818. There is a drawing of it attached and

is signed by John Quincy Adams, then Secretary of State and afterwards became the President of the United States. The autograph was a frank of the letter, making it go through the mail free. This document is now owned by the great-grand-son of William Simpson, Mr. Addison W. Simpson, Jr.

Archibald Simpson had a brother, John Simpson, who was a Chaplain in the Arm of the Revolution; also a Commander, who settled in the Fishing Creek district of South Carolina, a settlement near the town of Anderson, S. C.
