By the Honorable EDWARD TELFAIR, Esquire, Captain-General, Governor, and Commander in Chief in and over the state aforesaid,

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS good and sufficient information hath been received that a certain banditti of run-away Negroe men, who have been out-layers before and since the evacuation of the town of Savannah, have lately embodied themselves, and have with arms opposed the militia that have been ordered out to suppress them, and have also committed sundry depredations on the property of the inhabitants of the counties of Chatham and Effingham: I HAVE THEREFORE by and with the advice and consent of the Honorable the Executive Council, thought fit to issue this my Proclamation, hereby offering a Reward of Ten Pounds for each of the said run-away Negroe men, being brought to trial, or good and sufficient proof before a Magistrate, of each or either of the said run-away Negroe men being killed.

GIVEN under my hand and the great seal of the said state, at Augusta, this twenty-first day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-six, and of our sovereignty and independence the eleventh.
