A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS good and fufficient information hath been received that a certain banditti of run-away Negroe men, who have been out-layers before and fince the evacuation of the town of Savannah, have lately embodied themselves, and have with arms opposed the militia that have been. ordered out to suppress them, and have also committed fundry depredations on the property of the inhabitants of the counties of Chatham and Effingham: I HAVE THEREFORE by and with the advice and confent of the Honorable the Executive Council, thought fit to iffue this my Proclamation, hereby offering a Reward of Ten Pounds for each of the faid run-away Negroe men, being brought to trial, or good and fufficient proof before a Magistrate, of each or either of the faid run-away Negroe men being killed. .

GIVEN under my hand and the great feal of the faid flate, at Augusta, this twenty-first day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty-fix, and of our fovereignty and independence the eleventh.
