pg 349 v.1 Gov. Troup refused to stand for reelection. Clark's party had lost ground under his-Troups-strong administration. Troup's party chose John Forsyth of Augusta as candidate for Governor. Clark's party chose Duncan Green Campbell, its strongest leader, but Col. Campbell declined to be drawn into the race. They then chose Talbot who died a few days before the election and Forsyth was therefore elected without opposition.

Duncan Green Campbell married Mary Williamson, youngest daughter of Micajah Williamson (Lt. Col of Ga. Regiment commanded by Elijah Clarke) and Sarah Gilliam Williamson who had 5 successful sons and 6 beautiful refined educated daughters becoming wives of distinguished men

Duncan Green³ was born in N.C. in Feb. 1786, and was graduated from the University of North Carolina in 1806¹. In 1807, he moved to Georgia and in 1808, married Mary Williamson. He studied law in the office of Judge Griffin of Wilkes Co. and had charge of a Female Academy. Judge Griffin, because of ill health gave up his law practice and transferred it to Duncan Green. He was elected Solicitor General of Western Circuit, 1816, and elected Representative to the Legislature from Wilkes Co., and re-elected three times. He authored and introduced, July 16, 1824, the first bill in history of Georgia, having for its purpose the education of the women of the state. He was an enthusiast for public education. He made professional connection with Garnett Anderson. He and James Meriwether were appointed by Pres. Monroe to form a treaty with the Creek Indians for sale of land to Georgia and Alabama. This treaty was a subject of great controversy and the main campaign issue in the gubernatorial race between Gov. George Troup and Campbell's brother-in-law General George Clarke (they had married sisters). Troup, who had defended the treaty, won. Duncan Green was a trustee of the University of Ga. In 1828, he was ~~running~~ ~~asked~~ for the governorship and his success seemed certain. However on the day before the election, he died at the age of 42. He was buried at his plantation near Washington, Ga, but was afterward interred in Rest Haven Cemetery.

He left a son, John Archibald⁴ and two daughters, Sarah and Rebecca.

Duncan Green graduated U.N.C. 1807. He moved to Ga. 1808. He was head master of the Female Academy while he studied law with Judge Griffin of Wilkes Co. Later was law partner of Garnet Andrews. He was made Solicitor General of the Western Court and Represented Wilkes Co. four terms in the State Legislature where he introduced a Bill for establishment of a Woman College. He was a Trustee of U.Ga. He was appointed commissioner by Pres. Monroe, with James Meriwether, to negotiate with the Creek Indians for sale of Ga and Ala lands. ~~He was a candidate for Governor of Georgia, but died the day before election.~~

Story of Washington, Wilkes Co., (Ga.) W.P.A.

1805 Mrs Mary Paulina Dugas, a French Revolution refugee, opened a school for girls in W. It proved to be so successful, it moved to Augusta. Washington then established The Female Academy, June 16, 1814. Board and tuition \$100. Duncan Green Campbell was one of its first principals.

Reminiscences of Famous Georgians

Duncan Green Campbell was a Trustee of U.Ga. (Athens) under Pres. Waddell 1817-1828.

Campbell County, Ga. was named for him

to the memory of

Col. Duncan Green Campbell

Who died Jy. 31, 1828

his soul to his God

Respected, beloved, lamented

He lived and died an honest man

A true patriot and a sincere Christian

Duncan Green Campbell was a friend and brother in law of General John Clark. Both married sisters of Col William W. Williamson. His daughter, was considered most precocious. She married Daniel Chandler and moved to Ala

Source 12 John Archibald's family, including Duncan Green was living in or near Hillsboro, N.C. as late as 1794. He came to Ga., Wilkes Co., 1810. Late third generation largely moved to Ala.
