

# Samuel C. Candler

## Rites Held at Madison

**Madison** - Services for Samuel Charles Candler, 77, a Madison businessman and trustee emeritus of Emory University, were Monday at the First United Methodist Church here. Burial in Oxford City Cemetery.

Mr. Candler, son of the late Methodist Bishop Warren A. Candler and nephew of Asa G. Candler, founder of the Coca-Cola Co., died Saturday.

He was born in the old Emory College president's home in Oxford, when his father was president there.

He was married to Asa Can-

transferring Emory to Atlanta in 1915. Mr. Candler worked on the first building erected on the new campus in 1916, following his graduation from Emory College that year.

The same year he enrolled in the first Emory University law class but his schooling was terminated by the outbreak of World War I, in which he served as a captain with the American Expeditionary Forces.

After the war Mr. Candler became associated with a warehouse and wholesale grocery firm in Covington and later acquired farming interests in Morgan County.

Candler was on the board of the Georgia Western Christian Advocate for more than 25 years and had been on the Emory board of trustees since 1942. He also was active on Emory's Committee of 100 and for many years was councilman for the Emory Class of 1916.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Frances Godfrey Candler, and daughters, Mrs. Frances Candler Schumway of Decatur and Mrs. Lowry

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CANDLER, Allen Daniel (cousin of Ezekiel Samuel Candler, Jr., and Milton Anthony Candler), a Representative from Georgia; born in Homer, Banks County, Ga., November 4, 1834; attended country schools, and was graduated from Mercer University, Macon, Ga., in 1850; studied law; during the Civil War entered the Confederate Army as a private in Company H, Thirty-fourth Regiment of Georgia Infantry on May 12, 1862; was elected first lieutenant May 17, 1862; promoted to captain October 26, 1862; appointed lieutenant colonel May 16, 1864; promoted to colonel December 27, 1864; engaged in agricultural pursuits; member of the State house of representatives 1873-1877; served in the State senate in 1878 and 1879; engaged in manufacturing and was president of a railroad; elected as a Democrat to the Forty-eighth and to the three succeeding Congresses (March 4, 1883-March 3, 1891); was not a candidate for reelection in 1890; secretary of state of Georgia from May 28, 1894, until March 1, 1898, when he resigned; served as Governor of Georgia from 1898 to 1902; compiler of the records of the State of Georgia from 1903 until his death in Atlanta, Ga., October 26, 1910; interment in Alta Vista Cemetery, Gainesville, Ga.
