A member of one of Georgia's most aristocratic families—Miss Mary C. Calhoun, daughter and grand-daughter of Atlanta mayors—died Friday.

She died at the nursing home where she lived at the age of 93, peaceful and in virtual obscurity, said she lived with a son in her

home.

She had all the instincts of being a lady even in poverty, said

the son, who said she lived in a small room in a small house in the city.

She was born in 1867, the daughter of a prominent family in the city.
